# Scottish Mentoring Network National Event & Recognition Awards 2019 Event Round Up & Award Winners



Scottish Mentoring Network held its National Event and Recognition Awards on Wednesday 13th November 2019 at St. Paul's & St. George's Church in Edinburgh. The conference was attended by over 80 delegates from 45 organisations, and was opened by Scottish Mentoring Network's Chief Executive, Maureen Watson, along with SMN's Chair, Allison Calder.



It was a very chilly morning in Edinburgh when the delegates at the event were introduced to the theme of the day—*Influencing*—by Mark Ballard, the Coauthor of the *Public Affairs Guide to Scotland: Influencing Policy and Legislation.* Mark shared with the delegates his key ingredients to engaging with politicians and decision makers. His Keynote speech was the perfect introduction for the delegates to the theme which was threaded through the rest of the day's programme.

Following this Keynote address, we got the delegates on their feet to participate in a facilitated networking activity—Find Your Match. In all the delegates name badges, we had placed one half of a jigsaw piece. The task for the delegates was to find the other person with the same number of jigsaw piece and when they had found them, find out the One Thing they had in common. We wanted to give delegates the opportunity to network with their fellow mentoring co-ordinators, but we also wanted to reflect the journey which mentors and mentees go on when they are first matched.





Once the delegates had the chance to find their match, it was time to move to the first round of SMN Recognition Awards for 2019. They were presented to the winning projects in each of the award categories:


**Outstanding Practices in Safeguarding:** Ypeople Calm Mentoring

This year, Scottish Mentoring Network invited the winners of the category awards to participate in a Q&A session. Delegates were able to pose the question to the panel of winners via Sli.do, and discussed the successes and challenges that the co-ordinators had experienced whilst running their mentoring programmes.

After the panel discussion, the day progressed to the Network & Learning Discussions which were introduced by SMN Board Director, **Fiona Ellis**. The delegates were given the task of creating a short message designed to influence a decision maker. The messages were then collected on the SMN feedback wall, to help SMN to understand the messages that the members want to get across to key decision makers.



Following the roundtable discussions the AGM

began with a round up of the last financial year's activities. As there were vacancies on the SMN Board of Directors, there was a short election to recruit the new directors. Allison Calder from Rock Trust, was re-elected as a General Member Director, along with Alastair MacGregor from SSERC and Melanie Armstrong from

Glasgow Caledonian University.



After the networking lunch there was a choice of five breakout sessions on offer. Sessions included: Exploring Online Learning, The Voice of Mentoring Scheme Leads, Behavioural Science and Mentoring, Dekko Comics and Reporting Using Stats and Stories: A Peer Learning Session.

This year at the National Event, SMN gave members the opportunity to give feedback via a voting system up on a wall. We asked the members what kinds of topics they would like to see from the upcoming networking events and presented

highlights from last year's networking

events.

The day was concluded with the presentation of SMN Project Quality Award certificates to the projects that had achieved this over the past year.

The eight projects which have been awarded the Project Quality Award in the past year are:


